to see some incredible players and to try out some of the latest drum technology."

The day also included giveaways, with a DTXPRESSIII and monitor system as the main prize.

Demo rooms allowed visitors to try out and purchase gear.

DTXplosion showcased how digital drums can be used in teaching, practice, worship, the recording studio, and live performance settings. Dicciani demonstrated the educational aspect, McQuitty covered
